Emergency Evacuation Drill



For schools that have a smoke detector or a sprinkler system in all classroom buildings, at least six Emergency Evacuation Drills must be conducted during the school year.

(Ohio Revised Code (R.C.) § 3737.73(A); OFC § 405.1.1(iii))

Tornado Drill



At least one tornado drill must be conducted during each month of tornado season (April 1 – July 31) while school is in session.

(OFC § 408.2(d))

School Safety Drill



Safety drills provide **students** with instruction in responding to situations in which students must either rapidly evacuate or be secured in the building in response to a threat caused by an act of violence. The law mandates that at least one of these **three** drills require students to be secured in the building (lockdown).

- Review of rally points/safe locations





Drill Day

Students/Staff listen to announcement & respond

- All school evacuation to rally points
- All school lockdown/barricade
- Respond to situation
- After Drill Debriefs
 - **Building Safety Team**
 - Staff / Students

Drill Day

Classrooms / Students act independently in response to a situation based on available information

- Sights & Sounds
- All activities are at realistic pace
- After Drill Debriefs
 - Students
 - Staff

Theoretical School Safety Drill



The theoretical school safety drill is to provide instruction to school faculty and staff regarding procedures to be followed in response to a sudden emergency caused by an act of violence.

TABLETOP EXERCISE

• The intent is to discuss various issues regarding a hypothetical, simulated emergency. Audio

FUNCTIONAL EXERCISE

- The focus is to see how policies and procedures work in a realistic, but still simulated setting.
- The practice may include changes in the situation that management must respond to through quick adjustments.

FULL SCALE EXERCISE

- Will exercise multiple functional content area sections of plan, involve first responders (fire, law enforcement, EMS, and/or emergency management, Homeland /TSA), local officials and community organizations.
- The full scale exercise may include:
 - Evacuation
 - Family reunification
 - Lockdown
 - Reverse evacuation
 - Emergency notification

Threat Assessments



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In K-12 schools, a *behavioral threat assessment* is a proactive approach to identify, assess, and provide appropriate interventions and resources for students who display a behavior that elicits concern for the safety of themselves or others.

- ✔ Focuses on behaviors, not traits or profiles
- ✔ Involves multidisciplinary school staff
- Identifies threatening and other concerning behaviors, and assesses them in context
- ✔ Provides students with additional supports
- ✓ Utilizes existing school resources
- ✔ Promotes a safe school climate

- Is not a criminal investigation
- **X** Is not a disciplinary process
- Does not involve zero tolerance
- **X** Does not replace student support programs
- **X** Is not a physical security measure
